Delaware County Fair Code of Ethics & Conduct

"Dr. Jeff Goodwin has said that we cannot legislate or regulate morality." While that may be true to a large extent, we believe we can educate morality. Honesty, integrity and treating others the way you would like to be treated are examples of ethical principles that can and should be taught. An approach that is often used is to teach people to determine if a particular livestock showing practice is ethical or unethical by the use of several key questions:

Does the practice violate Federal Drug Administration law?
Is it a fraudulent misrepresentation of the animal?

Does the practice compromise the welfare of the animal?

If any of these questions are answered yes, the practice is unacceptable.

Two additional questions could be asked if there is a gray area that cannot be cleared up with these first three questions:

Does the practice have anything to do with real world, commercial agriculture?

Will the public stand for it?

If one of these last two questions is answered no, a red flag is raised and the practice needs to be analyzed to ensure that it is acceptable.

Dr. Goodwin continues to emphasize that we can teach ethics to children and young adults. He reported research studies showing that ethics education is effective and changes both attitudes and behaviors of show persons.

The above statement is from the Minnesota Foundation for Responsible Animal Care:

The primary goal of the Delaware County Fair program is to build character in youth and adults while participating in fair programs. Delaware promotes the six core ethical values of the **CHARACTER COUNTS!** Curriculum: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship. Unethical behavior including but not limited to dishonesty by lying, deception or omission in conjunction with any activity/event will not be tolerated. Youth or adults accused of unethical behavior will be subject to the appropriate county or state Review Boards to determine future participation and eligibility for participation in fair activities. Failure to act with good character could result in loss of privileges for current or for future Delaware County Fair Events.

Trustworthiness

Be honest • Don't deceive, cheat or steal • Be reliable — do what you say you'll do • Have the courage to do the right thing • Build a good reputation • Be loyal — stand by your family, friends and country

Respect

Treat others with respect; follow the Golden Rule • Be tolerant of differences • Use good manners, not bad language • Be considerate of the feelings of others • Don't threaten, hit or hurt anyone • Deal peacefully with anger, insults and disagreements

Responsibility

Do what you are supposed to do • Persevere: keep on trying! • Always do your best • Use self-control • Be self-disciplined • Think before you act — consider the consequences • Be accountable for your choices

Fairness

Play by the rules • Take turns and share • Be open-minded; listen to others • Don't take advantage of others • Don't blame others carelessly

Caring

Be kind • Be compassionate and show you care • Express gratitude • Forgive others • Help people in need

Citizenship

Do your share to make your community better • Cooperate • Get involved in community affairs • Stay informed; vote • Be a good neighbor • Obey laws and rules • Respect authority • Protect the environment

IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics*

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport (represent) themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. The Delaware County Fair is bound by the ODA Livestock Health Exhibition Rules of the Ohio Administrative Code 901:1-18-01 thru 901:1-18-11 and ODA Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules of the Ohio Administrative Code 901-19. Copies of this code are in the Fair office and online at: <http://www.ohioagriculture.gov/>

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example.

Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows.

Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

FAIR GENERAL RULES

1. The Delaware County Fair is bound by the ODA Livestock Health Exhibition Rules of the Ohio Administrative Code 901:1-18-01 thru 901:1-18-11 and ODA Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules of the Ohio Administrative Code 901-19. The Junior Fair will operate under the provisions of the current year's Ohio Livestock Show Reform Act and under all applicable Ohio Department of Agriculture Administrative Code Rules as adopted by the Senior Fair Board. Copies of the current year's Ohio Livestock Show Reform Act are available in the Extension office and the Senior Fair office and online at: <http://www.ohioagriculture.gov/pubs/>
2. The Junior Fair is composed of Delaware County 4-H clubs, FFA Chapters, Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) Chapters, Scouts, Farm Bureau Youth Council and Industrial Technology Clubs.
3. The Fair Advisory Council will consist of the Delaware County Agricultural Society Exhibits Committee, the Extension Program Personnel, selected Vocational Agriculture and Work & Family Life teachers, appointed 4-H Club Advisors, Junior Fair Board Officers, and the Junior Fair Coordinator, as well as the department heads of all exhibiting departments of the fair.
4. The Junior Fair Board members are appointed by a selection committee overseen by the 4-H office. Appointments to the board are based on leadership, dependability and achievements in junior activities. Vacancies are filled by the 4-H Extension Office. Appointments shall be made from eligible applicants. Junior Fair Board Members serve at the discretion of the Delaware County Fair Advisory Council.
5. All rules applying to open classes will also apply to Junior Fair if determined by Senior Fair Board or Junior Fair Advisory Committee.

6. Junior Fair show committees, the Fair Advisory Council and the Senior Fair Board are responsible for enforcement of rules. Final authority rests with the Senior Fair Board.
 7. Exhibitors in the Delaware County Junior Fair must be 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Scouts, Farm Bureau Youth Council, VICA or Industrial Technology Club members. All exhibitors must be in the third grade and eight years of age as of January of the exhibit year to make individual exhibits and must not have reached their 19th birthday as of January 1 of the exhibit year, or be enrolled in K-2nd grade Cloverbud 4-H program.
 8. Products exhibited must be from projects carried in the current year through groups comprising the Delaware County Junior Fair Exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor, to be certified by the leader or instructor in charge of the projects at the time entries are made. Exhibitors with leased horses must have a copy of the horse agreement on file in the Extension Office by July 1st. Exhibitors with leased alpacas, llamas or dairy animals must have a copy of the lease agreement on file with the Extension office by the June deadline. All exhibits to be from the current year's projects. All livestock exhibits must be from 4-H Club or FFA projects. Scouts must exhibit with their group in the space assigned.
 9. All registered livestock shown must be registered in the name of the junior fair exhibitor or immediate family, unless part of an approved lease agreement. Registration papers may be checked and must be furnished when requested. Junior Fair members are not required to have registered animals to be eligible to show, however, Jr. Fair members must have registered animals to participate in the open class shows where necessary. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
 10. Junior Fair exhibitors may exhibit in the open show and are not required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket.
 11. Junior Fair Exhibitors are required to keep their animals in the stalls or pens assigned to them by the Junior Fair. All Cattle must be securely fastened. All beef cattle including dairy beef feeders must be secured with a halter and neck ties.
 12. Only members of 4-H and FFA carrying a market project will be eligible to show and sell livestock projects at the fair.
 13. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Any person doing so, be they exhibitor, parent, family, bystander, or onlooker will be asked to refrain and if not will be remanded to legal authorities and will be subject to expulsion from the grounds.
 14. No person is to interfere with the judging or assist persons giving demonstrations, showing livestock, or being interviewed. Prompting by parents or other individuals with hand signals, facial expressions, eye movement or any other signal system will be grounds for disqualification for premium and special awards, at the discretion of the committee in charge.
 15. No parents or other individuals are to be in the immediate vicinity or participate in the interview judging by answering questions, commenting or questioning the judge.
 16. Judges decisions on awards and placings are final.
 17. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to violate these rules or The Delaware County Fair Code of Ethics & Conduct or knowingly contribute to or cooperate with another person or persons' violation, whether by affirmative action or inaction. Any such person shall be subject to disciplinary action.
 18. If five or more animals of any one breed not listed in the Junior Fair Handbook are to be shown as Junior Fair project exhibits, a class will be established and premiums will be paid at a rate comparable to similar exhibits.
 19. Where pens of livestock are shown, all animals in the pen must be owned by the exhibitor of the pen.
 20. Exhibitors who have sold market animals at another county Junior Fair are ineligible to show or sell market animals at the Delaware County Fair in the same year, with the exception of Independent Fairs.
 21. All exhibitors are expected to be present and personally take care of his or her own projects while exhibiting at the fair. The exhibitor must be present and personally work on all fitting and grooming of any livestock project. An exhibitor may receive assistance only from an immediate family member, Delaware 4-H advisor or FFA advisor, or another 4-H or FFA member, in fitting and/or grooming of the exhibitor's livestock project(s). No professional groomers or fitters are permitted. An immediate family member is defined as the exhibitor's parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, step-parents, step grandparents and step-siblings, guardians and siblings. Violations of this rule may subject the exhibitor to loss of premiums and loss of sales privileges. Complainants must present signed complaints to the show chairperson or the Junior Fair Office.
 22. Exhibitors are not eligible to **enter, show or sell** more than one market project or species.
 23. Livestock exhibitors must have animal(s) in their possession, under daily care and are responsible for feeding and caring for the animals. They must be penned apart from the herd or flock by June 1, unless a different date is specifically stated in the rules. (i.e.: market beef) All rabbits and/or brood does of meat pen rabbits must have been owned and under the continual care of the exhibitor from May 15 of current year. All breed rabbits must have been owned and under the continual care of the exhibitor from June 1 of current year. The exceptions on the June 1 date are dairy & beef feeders, turkeys, steers, horses, and market chickens. Refer to Department rules for actual possession dates. Any animal secured after the species' possession deadline must be approved by the Fair Advisory Council.
 24. Exhibitors who are sick, injured or cannot be present at show or sale time may have another Delaware County Junior Fair member in good standing weigh, show or sell their animal. They must present to the show chairperson or Junior Fair Office a written request for permission stating who will show the animal. Request will be filed with the Fair Secretary.
 25. The following livestock and animals must be identified by the method and date specified in the chart below. Identification paperwork is mailed to 4-H members and FFA advisors by May 15th and also available at the Extension Office for those who did not receive their direct mailing. Animals that are not tagged by the approved method or that do not have photo ID in the Extension Office by the date specified will be ineligible for participation in the Delaware County Junior Fair.

26. All entries are to be made on junior fair entry forms filled out completely. **Entries must be delivered to the Ohio State University Extension, Delaware County office, by 5:00 p.m., the Fourth Friday in August. Any entries received after this date will be charged a fee of \$30.00 per exhibitor. No entries accepted seven days after the entry date. FFA, VICA, Industrial Technology, & FCCLA entries must be in by the end of the first week of school.** All booth entries are due the last Friday of July at the OSU Extension, Delaware County Office.
27. Exhibitors will be limited to one entry in each class unless stated differently in show specific rules. If making more than one entry in a class, as allowed by department rules, write Department, Section and Class for each entry on the entry form.
28. All exhibits -- unless specified under Department rules - must be in place by 9:00 a.m. the first Saturday. Exhibits not in place by 9:00 a.m. Saturday will not be eligible to exhibit in the current year.
29. No project will be released until the official release time unless released because of sickness or injury by the Fair veterinarian and / or Fair Secretary / Manager.
30. Junior Fair exhibitors removing exhibits before the Fair officials release the exhibits will forfeit premiums, special awards and are not allowed to participate as an exhibitor for one year following the violation. Official release times are:
Market Beef and Feeders, Market Goats, Rabbits, Poultry - 7 p.m. Wednesday,
Market Hogs & Lambs Going Through Sale - After Auction
Breeding Sheep and 2nd Market Lambs Not Going Through Sale – Morning Prior to Sale
Horses, Dairy Animals, Alpacas, Llamas, & Goats - 8:00 p.m. Thursday
All Exhibits & Booths in Jr. Fair Building – 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. Sunday, September 21st
31. All exhibitors taking Market Beef, Beef or Dairy Feeder Calves, Market Lambs, Market Rabbits, Market Poultry, Goats (including Pygmy and Pack) and Dairy Cattle are required to fulfill Delaware County's Quality Assurance requirements as set forth at the beginning of the project year. All Market Hog exhibitors are required to fulfill Delaware County's Pork Quality Assurance requirements as set forth at the beginning of the project year.
32. The Senior Fair Board shall have the right to examine or test an animal for any illegal substance that changes the conformation or temperament of the animal. Any exhibitor whose animal contains any unlawful substance may be found in violation of this rule and may be subject to disqualification and forfeiture of any and all premiums, awards and sale proceeds from that year's fair, disqualification and banishment from future fairs, and other disciplinary action. The Senior Fair Board shall have final authority with respect to this rule.
33. Champion and Reserve Champion individual or pen market animals sold through the sale must be harvested after the fair at a designated location.
34. No person may win an award for both the Grand Champion and reserve grand champion in any market species in the same year.
35. Wood chips, sawdust or straw are the only approved bedding for animals unless otherwise specified by department rules.
36. **All exhibitors selling a market animal or product through the Junior Fair Sales at the Delaware County Fair must turn in an addressed, stamped thank you note to the Fair Office prior to receiving a sale check.**

37. Junior fair exhibitors staying overnight during the fair must have a completed overnight permission form on file in the Senior Fair Office.
38. The Senior Fair Board reserves the right to prorate premiums should it be necessary to do so.
39. **PREMIUM PAYMENTS** - Premium payments will be paid by check to each exhibitor within 30 days of the completion of the fair. Cloverbud exhibits will be paid at time of drop off of exhibit. Premium payments do not include sale proceeds.
40. The exhibitor's signature on the Junior Fair entry form or participation in the Jr. Fair, indicates the exhibitor and the parent(s)/guardian(s) agrees to be bound by the Rules and Regulations in the Delaware Junior Fair Handbook and further agrees to be bound by the decision of the Sr. Fair Board in case of any dispute arising from the interpretation or application thereof. Premiums will not be paid if entry form is not signed.
Premium checks not cashed within 90 days of issuance will not be reissued and funds will be credited to the Junior Fair Scholarship Fund.

RULES FOR ALL JUNIOR FAIR SHOWMAN & FITTING & GROOMING CONTESTS

1. Participants must be eligible Delaware County 4-H or FFA members; and must be at least 8 years old and in the 3rd grade and be under 19 years of age as of January 1st of the current year. Unless stated otherwise in department rules, all showmanship and fitting & grooming classes are broken by the following ages, based on the exhibitor's age as of January 1st. Senior classes are ages 15-18. Intermediate classes are ages 12-14. Junior classes are ages 8-11. Participants must have entries in the current fair and show their animal that was entered in the current fair.
2. Species Showman of Showmen classes are open to any previous showmanship winner who is still eligible to show in the Junior Fair and the current year's showmanship winners.
3. The Junior Fair Livestock Showman of Showmen Contest is open to the Showmen of Showmen from Dairy Cattle, Pygmy Goats or Dairy/Market Goats, Sheep, Market Beef, Feeder Calf, Market Swine, English Horses, Western Horses, Rabbits, Dogs, Poultry and Alpaca/Llama as selected by the show committee.
4. Species showmanship, (excluding Llamas, Alpacas, Horses, & Dogs) or fitting & grooming winners are not eligible to participate in the same age class the following year. Age class winners can sit out for one year following their win or may move up to the next age class. Once a winner shows in the next age class, they may not go back down.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS FOR VIOLATIONS OF RULES

- (A) Any person who violates a provision of the Fair Rules or the rules of the State of Ohio Livestock Exhibition Rules may be subject to any of the following disciplinary actions:
- (1) Disqualification from any exhibition;
 - (2) Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition;
 - (3) Continuing education;
 - (4) Written letter of reprimand;
 - (5) Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
 - (6) Pre and or Post-exhibition drug testing;
 - (7) BANISHMENT
 - (8) Other Disciplinary Actions as determined by the

Senior Fair Board

- (B) Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.
- (C) All violations of the rules are serious. The severity of violation will determine the level of the disciplinary action. The Senior Fair Board has the final determination on the severity of the violation and the severity of the disciplinary action.

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application.

(A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.

(B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- (A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- (B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- (D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.

(E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.

(F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.

(G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules - Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;
 - (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- (D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl.

(A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

- (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph; or
- (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.

(B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraph (A)(2),(A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.

(C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle.

(A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.

(B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:

- (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
- (2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
- (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
- (4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
- (5) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
- (6) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.

(C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

(A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious

disease; and

(3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

(4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901:1-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or

(5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or

(6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.

(C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules and ponies.

(A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.

(B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition or obtain a permit for extended time granted by the chief of the division of animal industry as authorized in paragraph (C) of rule 901:1-17-01 of the Administrative Code; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio department of agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

(A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie.

901:1-18-10 Swine.

(A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) At a terminal show must:
 - (a) Show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (b) Originate from a county which sixty days prior to the

exhibition opening date had no pseudorabies quarantined herds; and

(c) Have no breeding swine present and all swine removed are delivered for immediate slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of these rules, the manager or sponsor of the exhibition may, prior to permitting the exhibition of any porcine animal at a terminal show require proof, for example a VS form 433, animal disease diagnostic laboratory submission form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection, the animal has been tested and classed "negative" to an official test for pseudorabies within forty-five days immediately preceding the opening date of the exhibition.

(2) At all other shows, must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within forty-five days preceding the exhibition opening date; and Must be negative to an official pseudorabies test within forty-five days of the exhibition opening date unless:

(a) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or

(b) Are suckling pigs accompanying a negative dam; or

(c) They originate from a pseudorabies vaccinated herd and meet the following conditions:

(i) The herd has had a negative monitored test within twelve months, and

(ii) The swine presented for show are negative to a pseudorabies differential test; or

(3) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a stage V area and show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.

(4) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.

(B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:

(1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date; and

(2) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:

(a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or

(b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season; or

(c) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.

(C) Swine moved within or imported into Ohio for racing shall:

(1) Be separated at all times from any other swine on the exhibition grounds by the greatest distance reasonably possible; and

(2) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and

(3) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:

(a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or

(b) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season;

(c) Are exempt by written permit issued by the department.

(4) Be exempt from the immediate slaughter requirement of paragraph (A)(c) of this rule.

901:1-18-11 Llama.

(A) Llama moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.

(B) Llama imported into Ohio for exhibition:

(1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date.

(2) When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

- There will be a Junior and Senior Division. Junior Division will be limited to those who are in the 8th grade or below as of the current fair. Senior Division will be limited to those who are in the 9th grade or above as of the current fair.
- A complete written recipe must accompany each auction entry and will be reviewed during registration. Recipes can be reviewed prior to fair by dropping them off at the Extension Office.
- Exhibitors may enter only one class.
- Exhibitor must make entire exhibit.
- Entries, except for decorated cakes, will be cut for judging.
- The exhibitor is responsible for removing their entry after the auction.
- Exhibitors of best 5 in each class (as determined by judges) will be interviewed briefly at approximately 4:30 p.m. This will be done before selection of Champion and Reserve Champion.
- Champion and Reserve will be selected in each class.
- To be selected as Champion or Reserve Champion, exhibitor must be present for interview and auction.
- First place winners will sell in the auction. Only the Champion Baked Goods will be auctioned.
- Champion winner from previous year may NOT compete for same champion award two consecutive years. This allows more exhibitors a chance to win plus encourages a broad range of baking experiences for exhibitors.
- An exhibitor in the baked goods auction cannot enter, show or sell a market animal or item in the same year.
- 5% of auction sales will be retained for sale expenses.
- Winners must transport winning entries to sale arena.
- Steer Sale Committee reserves the right to handle any matters related to the auction.
- Due to food safety concerns, baked goods products which require refrigeration are not allowed as entries for baked goods auction. The following lists what will disqualify a Baked Goods Auction entry:

A. Food containing uncooked or undercooked (raw) eggs or egg products. Only commercially pasteurized dehydrated egg whites will be permitted in icings. No powered egg whites will be allowed in icings.

B. Foods containing uncooked or undercooked dairy products such as sour cream, cream cheese, milk, cream, etc. A small amount of milk in combination with confectioners sugar will be allowed in making icing for baked goods including the auction. Use just enough milk to make the icing the desired consistency.

C. No prepared or commercial mixes or fillings may be used as the main ingredient in or on any baked goods except Junior and Senior Decorated Cake classes. Prepared mixes are purchased mixes such as: biscuit mix, pudding mix, canned pie fillings, cake mix, prepared icings, etc.

D. Foods containing or made with custard, pudding, or egg bases. These include: cream pies, custards, cream filled donuts, cream puffs, brownies and cakes containing cream cheese filling, brownies and cakes containing custard, cream or pudding fillings, pumpkin pie, cream cheese frosting, sour cream frosting, sour cream frosting, whipped cream topping frostings, pudding frosting, etc.

PRODUCTS IN VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE ABOVE FOUR POINTS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED AND SENT HOME. Ingredients which are allowed in a thoroughly baked product include eggs (Eggs in icing, whether cooked or uncooked, will not be allowed), milk, cream cheese (well blended with all other ingredients and not left in clumps), mayonnaise/salad dressing, cheese, etc. Judges and fair board committee reserves the right to make final decision on questionable products. If in doubt about ingredients or procedures of a recipe, call the Extension Office for clarification well in advance of judging or select another

recipe without any questionable ingredients.

1. **Read the FAIR GENERAL RULES.**
2. No class will consist of more than 10 animals.
3. Dairy feeders must be from dairy breeds to show in dairy feeder class. Beef feeders must be from beef breeds to show in the beef feeder class. Any feeders with obvious beef characteristics will be placed in the beef feeder class. Any questions will be resolved by the steer sale committee at the pre-conditioning and tagging in August.
4. It is mandatory that all feeders must be pre-conditioned at the fairgrounds on the date determined by the steer sale committee.
5. Dairy Feeders must be a steer, born after January 1 of current year, dehorned, and meet fair health requirements. No stags will be permitted to show.
6. Beef Feeders must be a heifer or steer born after January 1 of current year, dehorned, and meet fair health requirements.
7. It is recommended that male feeder calves be castrated by July 15th and be completely healed by tagging in August.
8. Feeders under 350 pounds and over 700 pounds will show in underweight and overweight classes, respectively. Underweight and overweight classes cannot show for champion or trophies except in showmanship and fitting and grooming classes.
9. Exhibitors may show up to 2 finished market beef animals and/or 2 beef feeders and/or 2 dairy feeders but can only sell one animal. Exhibitors may identify or tag up to 4 animals in each category.
10. Market Beef animals may be a heifer or a steer born after January 1 of the previous year, dehorned, and meet fair health requirements. Steers must be properly castrated and no stags will be permitted to show.
11. Effective in 2008: There must be a minimum of 3 heifers at the fair in order to have a separate Market Heifer class. If there are fewer than 3 heifers present, Market Heifers will show with steers in the same classes.
12. Finished market beef animals will show by shoulder height as determined by show committee. Beef and Dairy Feeders will be assigned to a show class by weight as determined by the sale committee.
13. Finished market beef animals must not have permanent incisor teeth showing.
14. Finished market beef animals will be graded and placed by the judge.
15. All finished market beef animals must weigh 900 lbs. or more to show and sell.
16. Members must have finished market beef project animals in their possession by March 1. Switching animals after March 1 is not permitted for any reason.
17. All finished market beef animals must have been tagged in March at the Delaware County Fairgrounds. The Sale committee reserves the right to refuse to tag unruly animals

or any dangerous and uncontrollable animal not broke to lead. In the interest of safety to exhibitors, any unruly animal will be ineligible to show and sell.

18. Beef heifers cannot show in both market and breeding classes in the Junior Fair.
19. Stall space will be assigned by barn committee.
20. The ringmen have authority to dismiss dangerous and uncontrolled animals. If an animal is dismissed by the ringmen, the animal may be sold, but there will be no placing of the animal by the judge. Two ringmen and the judge will make the final decision in the case of a dispute.
21. If an exhibitor leaves the ring during the show, unless the exhibitor is injured, the animal and the exhibitor will be dismissed from the class. That animal will not be placed in the class.
22. Bedding for the Beef Barn will be sawdust and/or mulch. The same type of bedding is to be used throughout the entire barn.

3. Market lambs must weigh a minimum of 85 pounds to go through auction.
4. Exhibitors may request one reweigh per animal at the scale. Animal will be removed and the scale cleaned immediately prior to reweigh. Second weight becomes the official weight. Reweigh must occur before the next animal is weighed.
5. Market lambs may be shown as a pen of 2 or single lamb. Each exhibitor may show 2 individual market lambs. To enter two individual lambs, record the market lamb division, section, and class twice on entry form. The Champion and Reserve Champion individual market lambs cannot be shown in the pen of two lamb class.
6. The Grand Champion exhibitor's second lamb is ineligible for Reserve Grand Champion.
7. Lambs may be ewes or wethers. If ewes are shown as market lambs they must not have been shown in breed classes in the Delaware Fair and must not have been shown as breeding stock in the open show or any other fair. Market lambs are eligible to show in the open Sheep Show market lamb class. Exhibitors must pay entry fees and follow open show Sheep Division rules
8. Lambs may be purebred, grade or crossbred. They are to be uniform in size, docked and castrated, showing no testicular tissue, if a male.
9. Castrated lambs must be completely healed showing no evidence of being castrated recently.

10. The individual market lambs and pen of 2 will be divided into weight classes by weighing at the fairgrounds.
11. Provisions will be made to haul and sell any lambs not making minimum weight.
12. All market lambs must be slick sheared at time of weigh-in.
13. Exhibitor must be present for weighing and showing unless provisions have been made according to the General Livestock Rules.
14. Market lambs will be sold Wednesday.
15. All show lambs not selling through the sale must be removed from the Pig & Lamb barn on Wednesday before 6:00 p.m., but not before Wednesday morning.
16. Drenching of lambs for a medical condition is acceptable only when prescribed in writing by the approved Delaware County Fair Vet or their appointee. Drenching of lambs in other circumstances is prohibited.
17. Use of any material, gas, solid or liquid that conceals transforms or enhances the true conformation or configuration of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite and hemp is prohibited.
18. Application of ice, ice packs or cold packs prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition is acceptable only when diagnosed in writing by the approved Delaware County Fair Vet or their appointee.
19. Lambs will be housed in the assigned pens with the approved bedding for the Pig & Lamb Barn.
19. All lambs shall be in their pens or in the assigned designated work area by 5:00 p.m. Sunday evening. Any lambs outside of the barn or designated work area by 5:00 p.m. Sunday are ineligible to show and/or sell at auction.
20. No coverings of any kind shall be on the animals after 5:00 p.m. Sunday. There shall be no fans operating in the barn after 5:00 p.m. Sunday. Any lambs with any coverings on them and/or operating fans on them are ineligible to show and/or sell at auction.
21. All exhibitors and parents must sign consent to understand form prior to weigh in and turn in with the Drug Use Notification. Exhibitors failing to complete both forms are ineligible to show and/or sell at auction.
22. All liquids shall be consumed naturally from a bucket. There should be water in the pens for the lambs consumption at all times. Animals found with muzzles are immediately ineligible for the show and/or sale at auction.
23. The Senior Fair Board shall have the right to examine or test an animal for any illegal substance that changes the conformation or temperament of the animal. Exhibitors who may be found in violation of this rule may face forfeiture of any and all premiums from that year's fair and potential banishment from that and future fairs as well as disciplinary action as the Senior Fair Board may deem to be appropriate.
24. If problems arise from the packer with a project animal, the exhibitor is held financially responsible.
25. The Sheep Skillathon will be held on Saturday, September 15, in the Junior Pigs & Lamb Barn from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. There will be three age groups: 9-11 years; 12-14 years; and 15-18 years. There will be prize money of \$25.00 for first place, \$15.00 for second place, and \$10.00 for third place in each age group.

7. Grand and reserve champion individual and pen lambs and hogs must sell and be slaughtered at the designated place established by the sale committee. All market hogs must sell. Second hogs will be sold for market price. Hauling arrangements will be made.
8. Lamb's wool must be completely dry at the time of weighing. Lambs should not be washed Friday evening or on the day of weighing until after the weighing.
9. Exhibitors selling market animals at another county junior fair are ineligible to show or sell the same market species at the Delaware County Junior Fair.
10. Sale Committee reserves the right to refuse to sell unfit animals with excessive fill.
11. The sale committee reserves the right to handle all matters pertaining to the sale not covered by the above rules or General Rules.

Sales Fees - Expenses of the sale will be deducted on the basis of the dollar sales as determined by the sale committee.

Order Of Sale - Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Grand & Reserve Champion Pens, Champions of Weight Classes, skillathon winners. The balance of animals will sell by random

3. Showmanship will be divided into Pee Wee, Beginner, Junior, Intermediate and Senior classes. Pee Wee will be limited to those aged 5 to 4-H age.
4. Each exhibitor may show a total of 2 individual market pigs. If showing two hogs, exhibitors may show two gilts or two barrows or one of each.

6. Meat chicken and turkey exhibitors must be present at weigh-ins to be able to sell.
7. Exhibitors are limited to one meat pen entry of any type.
8. Minimum meat chicken pen weight is 14 pounds.
9. There is no minimum weight for market turkeys.
10. Meat chickens and turkeys must be purchased through the Extension Office.

- The Rabbit Skillathon will be held on Sunday, September 14 from 1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m. in the Junior Fair Show Arena. There will be three age groups: 9-11 years; 12-14 years; and 15-18 years. RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. Read the FAIR GENERAL RULES.

2. Exhibits must be project animals cared for by the exhibitor who is a member of a Delaware County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter.
3. Exhibitors of horse project(s) for the Delaware County Fair must have their animal in possession and daily care, as defined by Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows, cir 179, by July 1st and have submitted the Horse Agreement Form with photo(s) to the OSU Extension Office by the deadline. Exhibitors may register more than 1 project, but may only exhibit 1 animal, excluding production and miniature horse, at the Delaware County Fair.
4. Siblings (brothers, sisters, step brothers and/or step sisters) may share the same riding project for the Delaware County Fair. However, the project may only be shown once in a class type, even if the siblings are in different age groups. For example, be shown once in English showmanship, once in Western Showmanship, once in English Equitation, once in western horsemanship, etc. All siblings must share the daily care of the project and submit individual project registration cards. Siblings may also register each others projects as a backup project, as to allow them to share a riding project at the fair should one not be able to be shown at the Fair. This rule does not apply to the State Fair.
5. Exhibitor must lead the project (foal, yearling or 2 year old) in the production class and be enrolled in the production project.
6. In the event of an unforeseen illness, injury or death of a horse and the exhibitor does not have an additional horse registered by the deadline, the exhibitor may request in writing to the Extension Office to switch project horses if all the following are met: 1. The unforeseen illness or injury renders the horse unsound to be ridden and is certified by a veterinarian. 2. The advisor(s) of the exhibitor signoff on the written request that they judge the new horse is safe and sound for the exhibitor. 3. The letter requesting a change, along with the veterinarian certification and any other documentation must be submitted to the Extension Office no later than September 1st. If all of these conditions are met and approved, the exhibitor may show the new horse at the Delaware County Fair with the restriction that **they must show with no back number and will not be eligible to place in any class.** The exhibitor may go through grading line and receive their premium.
7. All animals must be checked in on the fairground by 9:00 am, Saturday. All horses must be checked in during measuring. The exhibitor need not be present. If the animal was measured at a PAS Qualifier Show, they do not have to be measured again but must still be checked in. Production projects may be brought in on Sunday by 10:00 am and are released after showing on Sunday, unless exhibiting in riding classes.
8. All exhibits may be released after 8:00 pm on Thursday, except for production exhibits, which may be released after showing. 4-H members who leave earlier than permitted will forfeit premiums and the right to exhibit in the Junior Fair for one year. No projects will be released until the official release time, unless released because of sickness or injury by official in charge or Fair veterinarian.
9. Every exhibitor is required to be interview graded for each animal exhibited prior to exhibiting in a class. Exhibitors

interviewed will be graded A, B, or C. Premiums will be paid on interview grade.

10. Interview grading will be based on; (a) Appearance of exhibitor and equipment used to show the animal; (b) Cleanliness of exhibit; (c) Grooming of exhibitor; (d) Ability to show the animal; (e) Exhibit to be serviceably sound; (f) Project book. The minimum dress requirement is jeans, long sleeve collared shirt, boots, belt, or appropriate show attire. Hats are optional, NO ball caps.
11. The judge has the right to request measurement of any horse or pony. All animals must be measured at one of the PAS qualifying shows or at the fair to be eligible for the fair. Any animal not measured must leave the fairgrounds by 9:00 pm Saturday.
12. All classes will receive a trophy for first place and rosette for second through sixth places. The Champion of the Junior Versatility classes will receive a trophy and all exhibitors will receive rosettes. The Champion and Reserve of the Senior Versatility classes will receive trophies and all other exhibitors will receive rosettes.
13. Exhibitors are not required to exhibit in Showmanship.
14. All exhibitors are expected to be present and take care of his or her own projects while exhibiting at the fair. In no way shall anyone except the exhibitor, immediate family member, Delaware 4-H or FFA advisor or another 4-H or FFA member, be permitted or assist in fitting and/or grooming of any animals. No professional groomers allowed. An immediate family member is defined as parent, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, step-parents, step-grandparents, step siblings, guardians and siblings. The exhibitor must be present and working at fitting and grooming of any of their animals.
15. All stalls must be cleaned before the exhibitor leaves on dismissal day. A \$25 charge will be assessed to the exhibitor's club for any stall not cleaned. All proceeds go to the Horse Advisors Committee.
16. The Versatility classes will have a maximum of 15 exhibitors in each class. Each exhibitor must be in their third year with a horse riding project. The age limit for the Junior Versatility class is up to age 14 as of January 1st. The age limit for the Senior Versatility Class is age 15 years and over as of January 1st. Versatility will consist of the following classes: in even number years, (A) Showmanship (English or Western), (B) English Equitation, (C) Western Pleasure, (D) Reining, and (E) Barrels. In odd numbered years, (A) Showmanship (English or Western), (B) English Pleasure/Hunter Under Saddle, (C) Western Horsemanship, (D) Reining, and (E) Barrels. Exhibitors must have placed in at least two of the classes for that year to qualify for the Versatility Class. Juniors may show in Reining class A, B, or C to qualify. Seniors may show in Reining class B or C to qualify. For the Versatility Class, Juniors will use pattern A and Seniors will use pattern B. A high point system will be used to select 15 exhibitors for each class.
17. The "Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows" and Delaware County 4-H Rules will prevail.
18. The show management has the right to revise the class or show schedule as necessary.
19. In the event of a rain delay, either partial or full day(s), the show will begin with the next class that was scheduled to run after the last completed class, as soon as conditions are deemed favorable by the show committee. The Show Committee is made up of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Junior Superintendent and one advisor or adult representative from each club.
20. Inspection of equipment / tack by a committee of advisors or the judge will be conducted before each group of classes, which includes barrels, speed & control, pole bending, cones and barrels and all cart classes.
21. The Beginner Classes are divided into 2 divisions, Walk-Trot and 3-Gaited. The Beginner Classes are open to exhibitors

in their 1st and 2nd year with a horse riding project however exhibitors are eligible to show in the 3-Gaited Division for only 1 year. Exhibitors may show in the Walk-Trot division for both their 1st and 2nd year or may show in Walk-Trot their 1st year and 3-Gaited their 2nd year. Exhibitors who show in the 3-Gaited division their 1st year are not eligible to show in the Walk-Trot Division their 2nd year. Exhibitors who choose to show in the beginner classes are ineligible to go in any of the other English and Western classes for which that beginner class is offered. **If an exhibitor shows in any walk-trot classes, they are ineligible to go in any 3-gaited classes including contest classes.** Exhibitors who qualify under PAS and shows at the State Fair are not eligible to show in any Beginner Classes.

22. Exhibitors may take the 4-H Horseless Horse Project book and sign up a horse project but must follow all rules, including possession, as all other horse projects.
23. All tack changes between classes must be reported to the announcer stand.
24. Exhibitors are to check-in at the arena gate during the class immediately preceding the exhibitors' next class. The 2 minute warning will be enforced from the time the first exhibitor enters the arena, except during tack changes.
25. A high point award will be given for English, Western (including reining, western riding and trail), Beginner, and Contest classes. A weighted high point system will be used. For classes with less than 6 exhibitors, points will be adjusted in accordance to the number of exhibitors in the class. The Judge will draw at the beginning of the show which class will be used for a tie breaker. Exhibitors that complete the Horse Skillathon will receive 2 point towards a high point award of their choice.

1. Read the FAIR GENERAL RULES.

2. Only 4-H and FFA members carrying dog projects and meeting specific club requirements are eligible to participate in these classes.
3. Only domestic dogs can be shown. Wolf and wolf hybrids are not permitted.
4. Pregnant and/or lactating (nursing) bitches are not permitted to be shown.

5. Any male or female dog that is a disturbing element to other dogs will be eliminated from the show and must leave the fairgrounds.
6. Bitches showing **any** signs of heat are not permitted on the Fairgrounds and are not permitted to be shown.
7. Any dog that is not under its handler's control and any handler who willfully interferes with another competitor or that competitor's dog will be excused from competition.
8. Any dog exhibiting unsafe or threatening behavior or any exhibitor or other person(s) abusing or neglecting the dog will be removed from the fairgrounds.
9. All dogs exhibited must be six months of age by the date of the judging. This includes Pilot Dog puppies and other Assistance Dogs.
10. Dogs must be kept on leash while on the fairgrounds, except when participating in the ring during judging. Dogs are not allowed in any of the barns or on the midway.
11. Muzzles, prong collars, and electronic collars are prohibited. Exhibitors will be disqualified if using. Head halters are permitted in Assistance Dog and Dog Care classes only. The use of chain leashes is discouraged.
12. Food treats or toys are not permitted in the show ring areas during obedience classes.
13. Dumb bells will be made of one or more solid pieces of wood or non-wooden material similar in size, shape and weight to a wooden dumb bell. Metal dumb bells are not permitted. Dumb bells will not be hollowed out. They may be finished, coated with a clear finish, or may be any color. They may not have any decorations or attachments but may bear an inconspicuous mark for identification. The size of the dumb bell will be proportionate to the size of the dog.
14. Dogs must be owned by the Junior Fair exhibitor or the exhibitor's immediate family. Immediate family is defined as the Junior Fair exhibitor's father, mother, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, grandfather or grandmother, including the corresponding step and half step relationships, or by a member of the exhibitor's household.
15. Ownership of Assistance Dogs is respective of each applicable organization.
16. Only the exhibitor may train the dog at any type of training class on or after June 1.
17. No one other than the Junior Fair exhibitor is permitted to show the project dog at any type of dog show or fun match on or after June 1.
18. Exhibitors showing their dogs at any Licensed or Member Obedience Trial or at a Sanctioned Match must show their dogs at the same or higher B level classes than they are showing in AKC, UKC, or other titling show. Dogs completing their Companion Dog (CD) title (or UKC or other titling equivalents) prior to or anytime during the project year must show in the Graduate Novice class at the very minimum.
19. Dogs completing their Companion Dog Excellent (CDX) title (or UKC or other titling equivalents) prior to or anytime during the project year must show in Open, Graduate Open, or Utility classes.
20. Any dog receiving one or more legs toward a title anytime during the project year must then move into the appropriate B class at the time the first leg was earned.
21. For Grooming & Handling classes, dogs with AKC Jr. Handling or like experience must be shown in exhibitor age-appropriate B classes. Dogs completing a title prior to, or anytime during the project year must show in exhibitor age-appropriate B classes. Any dog receiving points toward a championship title anytime during the project year must then move into the appropriate B class at the time the points are first earned.

22. The Dog Project Identification Form and Vaccination Certificate must be completed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian. See next rule for vaccinations required. All dogs must be currently licensed in the exhibitor's county of residence. **The exhibitor must submit the Dog Project Identification Form and Vaccination Certificate along with a copy of the certificate of license to the extension office with fair entries in order to be judged. Without these forms on file at the extension office they will not be allowed to be judged.**
23. All dogs must be vaccinated yearly by a licensed, accredited veterinarian. Required vaccines are: Rabies (1yr or 3yr must be specified), Distemper, Hepatitis, Leptospirosis, Parainfluenza and Parvovirus. If the veterinarian follows the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) recommendations, does vaccine antibody titer tests or feels that administering the Leptospirosis vaccination would jeopardize the dog's health the administering veterinarian must initial the applicable box under the DHLP section on the Vaccination Certificate. If the veterinarian does not administer certain vaccinations to older or other dogs, those vaccinations must be noted by the administering veterinarian either on the vaccination form or letterhead.
24. All classes are scored on exhibitor's appearance, dog's appearance and sportsmanship.
25. Exhibitors may enter up to two project dogs in obedience, but each dog must be eligible to be shown at a different level.

Registered animals must have registration papers with them at check in as required for USDA Scrapie ID compliance. The committee has the authority to dismiss questionable animals or animals that do not comply with USDA Scrapie identification requirements. If a goat is identified with a microchip, please bring a microchip reader with you to the fair.
7. Male goats over 8 weeks old must be castrated.
8. Due to space limitations, if the number of pens requested is greater than we have available, the superintendent will use discretion in assigning pens. Do not request extra pens for tack. Tack may be stored in the designated Tack Rooms in the barn or in the center aisle.
9. All goats are to have clean water available to them at all times. Water is not to be withheld from the market goats in the hours preceding the show.
10. Market goats must be born after January 1st of the current year, and in the member's care and possession by June 1. They must be tagged and/or tattooed by the Goat Committee on the first Saturday in June. (Note: Goats entered as Market Breeding Goats are not tagged in June. Only those entered as a meat/market project and intended to sell through the auction ring require tagging by the fair in June.)
11. A member may bring up to 4 market goats to the fairgrounds to be tagged and tattooed, but may only enter and bring 2 market goats to the fair.
12. Market goats must weigh at least 50 pounds and not exceed 110 pounds in order to compete for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. Market goats weighing less than 50 pounds will not be permitted to sell through the auction ring, but may sell for market price. Market goats weighing more than 110 pounds will be sold through the auction ring, but will be docked a processing premium.
13. Market goats must be slick shorn within the week prior to the show date, and must be shorn prior to weigh in on Saturday morning.
